The cliché, 'a picture paints a thousand words' seems a suitable introduction to the following photographs:



AN invitation has been sent to NCB chairman lan MacGregor to visit the old Roscheyworth Colliery following controversy over proposals to build a hypermarket at the site.

Traders in Abertillery are worried that if the NCB sells the land to Gateway Foodmarkets many shops in the town centre may be forced to close.

Blaenau Gwent councillors and Michael Foot MP are both fighting the proposals to build a hyper-market so near the town and the borough council have now sent alterter to Mr. MacGregor asking him to come and visit the area.

In January Gateway acquired, the 350-strong International Store chain and the company plans to open around 35 new stores this year.
